This Month in Irish History

- December 1, 1848 The paddle steamer The Londonderry, with immigrants fleeing the famine, takes shelter in Derry harbour. When the covers are removed from the hold it is discovered that 72 men, women and children had suffocated.
- December 1, 1946 Singer Gilbert (Richard)
 O'Sullivan is born in Waterford.
- December 3, 1792 Beginning on this date and continuing through December 8, a Catholic Convention is held in Tailors' Hall, Dublin to demand abolition of the remaining penal laws; a petition is presented to the king in London.
- December 4, 2009 Liam Clancy of the Clancy Brothers passes away
- December 6, 1921 Representatives of the Irish government appointed by President Eamon de Valera, and those negotiating for the Crown sign the Anglo-Irish Treaty, ending the Irish War of Independence against England. Michael Collins declares: "I have signed my own death warrant"

- December 7, 521 –Birth of Saint Columcille, Irish bard, and monk, honored in all the Celtic lands.
- December 8, 1831 Death of James Hoban, the Kilkenny architect who designed the White House. He also designed the state capital in Columbia, South Carolina
- December 13, 1862 the Irish Brigade of the Army of the Potomac suffered horrendous casualties during the Battle of Fredericksburg.
- December 1653 Oliver Cromwell becomes Lord Protector of Ireland.
- December 20, 1891 Annie Moore left Queenstown, Cork, Ireland today for Ellis Island.
- December 21, 1919 Dáil Éireann meets for the first time and elects Eamon de Valera as President of Ireland.
- December 23, 1688- English King James II flees to France and William of Orange seizes the throne of England.
- December 24, 1601 The Battle of Kinsale. . Hugh O'Neill and Red Hugh O'Donnell are heavily defeated by Mountjoy.
- December 27, 1886 Margaret Cruse wife of Thomas Cruse passes away after childbirth. Thomas Cruse was a major contributor to the building of the Cathedral of St. Helena.
- December 28, 1880 The trial of Parnell and others for conspiracy begins on this date
- December 31, 1759 Arthur Guinness signs a 9,000-year lease on four acres of ground at St James's Gate, Dublin, for an annual rent of 45£, including water rights.

History of the AOH in Montana

Have you ever wondered how the AOH came to be in Montana? Many people have asked that question, but few know why and when the AOH came to Montana. The growth of the AOH in Montana parallels the timeline of the development of the Montana Territory and the west.

The Ancient Order of Hibernians was formed in New York on May 1, 1836. As the AOH was developing on the east coast, the west was beginning to attract the Irish with new opportunities. The development of the railroads, growth of mining and the search for farming country, all brought the Irish west in great numbers. As my relatives would say, "We are two-boat Irish." They were the Irish that left Ireland and landed in the United States mainly on the East Coast. There second vessel being wagons, horseback, or railroads that brought them west. They traveled to such places as Michigan, Nebraska, Colorado, Nevada, Montana, and California. And wherever they gathered, AOH divisions were set up.

Hibernianism was an integral part of the Montana Territory. Its birthplace, as you might expect began in a log cabin in the mountains of the Continental Divide. It was near the mining camp of Vestal. The Irish miners formed Division #1, Deer Lodge County on July 10, 1879. The membership consisted of the miners working the mines around Vestal. The biggest mine being the Penobscott Mine owned by Nate Vestal. Not much information is known on the town of Vestal. The town's post office was established on September 9, 1878, and discontinued on April 5, 1881.

The Division in Vestal lasted as long as the mine lasted. The Penobscott was sold by Nate Vestal in the summer of 1878. As with many of gold mine claims when the gold ran out the miners moved on to the next claim. That is true of the Penobscott. Within months the gold was gone and the mine and the town were deserted and found the fate as many another gold claim.

J.D. Murphy, the first president and prominent in the organization of the division, abandoned Vestal and Division #1, Deer Lodge County ceased. He moved to the town of Butte, then only being incorporated for six years by a special act passed by the Montana Territorial Legislature. He located in Walkerville and was a true Hibernian and helped start the first AOH Division in Butte. He was also its first division President there, Division #2 Deer Lodge County was organized in March 1880. This Division became Silver Bow County Division #1 when Silver Bow County was created in 1881.

The summer of 1880 saw additional divisions organized in Townsend and Philipsburg. In 1882 the first AOH State Convention was held in Walkerville. As the AOH was expanding in the 1880's, so was the Montana Territory. You saw the first trains entering the territory and the Utah & Northern Railroad arrives in Butte in 1881.
